During year 2008 I became famous on Youtube with too many fans in Pakistan. A Mailsi farishta in Sweden Abbas Mian (<https://www.facebook.com/abbas.mian.90>) contacted me and narrated to me geography of Mailsi. He sent me photographs of remains of our Mailsi house - a treasure for my family.
