A satirical novel set in 1967 China from the Franz Kafka Prize-winning author of *Lenin's Kiss*—"one of China's greatest living authors" (The Guardian). *Serve the People!* is the story of a forbidden love affair between Liu Lian, the young wife of a Division Commander in Communist China, and a servant in her household, Wu Dawang. Left to idle at home while her husband furthers the revolution, Liu Lian establishes a rule for her orderly: whenever the household's wooden *Serve the People!* sign is removed from its usual place on the dinner table and placed elsewhere, Wu Dawang is to stop what he is doing and attend to her needs upstairs. What follows is a "steamy and subversive" story and comic satire on Mao's slogan and the political and sexual taboos of his regime (The Guardian). Originally banned in

China, *Serve the People!* is the first work from Yan Lianke to be translated into English, and "a scathing sendup of life in 1960s China during the chaos of the country's Cultural Revolution" (LA Times).

In the early modern period, the term 'enthusiasm' was a smear word used to discredit the dissenters of the radical Reformation as dangerous religious fanatics. In England, the term gained prominence from the Civil War period and throughout the eighteenth century. La première biographie française de John Bradburne (1921-1979), héros de guerre, musicien, poète, mystique et martyr, l'une des figures les plus attachantes de sainteté du XXe siècle dont le procès de béatification vient de s'ouvrir. Né en 1921 en Angleterre, fils de clergyman anglican, John Bradburne est un véritable personnage de roman. Jeune excentrique qui passe une partie de sa jeunesse dans les arbres, il sera un héros de la Seconde Guerre mondiale. À son retour, il se convertit au catholicisme et cherche sa voie à travers monastères et couvents avant de la trouver : il sera vagabond de Dieu, bouffon du Christ et troubadour de la Vierge Marie ! Il se lance sur les routes d'Europe et de Terre sainte, ermite ou SDF, et pratique des dizaines de métiers, tour à tour maître d'école, fossoyeur, maçon, vendeur, sacristain, éboueur, présentateur de télévision, comédien ou gardien. Puis il part en Afrique (Rhodésie) et y découvre, en 1969, Mtemwa, un lieu sinistre où une centaine de lépreux attendent la mort. Il décide de vivre avec eux et se fait

infirmier, gestionnaire, cuisinier, confident, et même croque-mort. Mtemwa devient une oasis de paix, de foi et de joie. Quand le centre est pris dans la tourmente de la guerre civile, John défend ses amis lépreux contre tous. Rejeté par les Blancs comme par les Noirs, il est kidnappé et assassiné en septembre 1979. Depuis son martyre, son culte se répand et les miracles semblent fleurir. Musicien et surtout poète, le plus grand de langue anglaise du XXe siècle par l'ampleur de son oeuvre, John Bradburne a vécu une étonnante aventure spirituelle. Son itinéraire montre que la recherche de Dieu peut remplir et combler une vie d'homme, et plus encore. Avec cette première biographie en langue française, Didier Rance, qui a enquêté à travers l'Europe et en Afrique, sur ses traces, rencontrant tous ceux qui l'ont connu, nous fait découvrir l'une des figures les plus fascinantes et attachantes de sainteté et d'humanité du XXe siècle, dont le procès de béatification vient de s'ouvrir.

Each description of the Major Arcana includes key word summaries, symbolic meanings, traditional interpretations, and a section where the card speaks for itself. Jodorowsky and Costa then take the art of reading the Tarot to a depth never before possible. Using their work with Tarology, a new

psychological approach that uses the symbolism and optical language of the Tarot to create a mirror image of the personality, they offer a powerful tool for self-realization, creativity, and healing.

Women Telling Nations highlights how, from the 16th to the 19th centuries, European women, as readers and writers, contributed to the construction of national identities. The book, which presents twenty countries, is divided into four parts. First, we examine how women belonged to nations: they represented territories and political or religious communities in their own style.
